MESSAGE TO SHAREHOLDERS

Though we all know how much we needed the rain, this year it seemed as if it would never quit!

The unusually wet weather delayed planting in Northern California. Once the season began in early May, we were off to a great start. We needed a good week to ten days to get most of the rice in when planting was cut short by – you guessed it...more rain!

The unusually cool, wet weather also delayed planting in the southern San Joaquin Valley. With that, we expect to be behind on sales as compared to last year. However through end May, we are only tracking about 6% behind our 2018 fiscal year on total sales.

As we approach our final quarter, our marketing team has been diligently working on stock sales and transfers. If you need to adjust the way your stock is registered, now is the time. In addition, if you are interested in purchasing additional stock, or know someone who is interested in becoming a CALAMCO member, please contact our office. We will put you in contact with the appropriate person to assist you.

We have mailed out letters to all growers who did not report any fertilizer use, or did not file a fertilizer use report in 2018. If you are no longer actively farming and wish to list your stock for sale, please contact our office. Per our by-laws, you must use nitrogen or nitrogen-based fertilizer to qualify as a member.

In 2018, only 9% of our shareholders received rebate checks via direct deposit. The rest received checks in the mail. In 2019, growers that opt to receive their rebate payment via direct deposit will receive an additional \$1 per ton. At this time, 19% of our members have signed up for direct deposit. There is still plenty of time to sign up, but we encourage you to do so as soon as possible. Visit our website at calamco.com and click on the link to sign up.

Where is the shower and eyewash; which way is the wind blowing; who do I call if there is a problem; is all my equipment in good working condition; do I have everything I need to get the job done safely?

When your safety coordinator/safety manager asks you to correct something, in the back of his or her mind, may be the thought that "Asking me to overlook a simple safety violation would be like asking me to compromise my entire attitude toward the value of your life." Employees are the most important part of any company - help your company look after YOU. \blacksquare
